

# **A Hangeul-like script for Japanese**

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# Kanji are hard

- Core set of kanji over 2000 characters
- Each one has multiple reading
  - 行: gyō, kō, i•ku, okona•u, oko•nau, yu•ki, ya•ru
- Students spend 6 years learning core set
- Need thousands more for serious reading

# Hanja are hard

- King Sejong, Joseon, 1443: Korean is not like Chinese
- Introduced Hangeul, a script designed for Korean, to replace Chinese characters
- Alphabetic system with syllable clusters  
ㅎ ㅣ ㄴ ㄱ ㅡ ㄹ → 한글

# Hangeul-like script for Japanese?

- Japanese isn't like Korean either – sound system is quite different
- Hangeul don't always fit
- So: Modify Hangeul for Japanese

# Vowels

- ʔ a, ʌ i, ɾ u, ɹ e, ɿ o
- ∅ as null consonant
- — as long vowel mark
- ʔ ya, ɾ yu, ɿ yo

# Consonants

- Korean has unaspirated, aspirated, tense
- Japanese has voiceless, voiced
- Use simple glyph for voiceless, add one stroke for voiced
- ㄱ/ㅋ k/g, ㅅ/ㅆ s/z, ㅌ/ㄷ t/d

# Consonants

- Kana scripts have only 9 consonants; use various hacks to support more
- が → ㄱㅏ
- ぱ → ㅍㅏ (ば → ㅃㅏ)
- しゃ → ㅅㅏ
- ちゃ → ㅈㅏ
- つ → ㅈㅓ
